# **Show Marshal Report For January 2017** Hybrid of the Month: Prosyclia [Prc.] (syn **Encyclia [E.]) Gertrude X Encyclia Mary Motes**

Grown by: Ian Nelson



This plant I got from Tinonee Orchids and it was potted, by the label, in 7/2010. It is Encyclia (nemorale x prismatocarpa) X (alata x plicata) Name changes come Encyclia [E.] adenocaula (syn. Epidendrum nemorale) Prosthechea [Psh.] prismatocarpa (syn. Epidendrum or Encyclia prismatocarpum) which makes Prosyclia [Prc.] Gertrude.

1<sup>st</sup> part of the cross, Encyclia (alata x plicata) is named Mary Motes

This plant also got best hybrid at Mingara over a week before. This plant has grown in full sun all day with no shade since August when we moved. It had 5 spikes and when carrying the plant I broke a spike off! This is an old picture with no missing flowers. Encyclia is in the Laelinae family and Orchidwiz says there are 199 species all from the Americas. I have a number of both species and hybrids and found them guite hardy and most species grow in a bark mix. One I have is in a 6" pot for many years and it grows over the pot. I take about 2 bulb divisions and it puts out new growth and flowers and it is growing up on itself. It also had 5 spikes.

# **Specie Plant of the Month:** "Prosthechea prismatocarpa" (syn Encyclia)

# **Grown by: Peter Christie**

This was a nice plant grown by Peter with its upright spikes, notice the name change and is 1/4 of my plant, the marking spots make it attractive .lt comes from Costa Rica and Panama. In Panama, plants are found in Chiriquí Province at



3950-4450 ft. (1200-1360 m). from Orchwiz. I have this plant also but found it a bit hard to flower. It is one worth having in your collection and grows well in bark. Like most plants, when you find the spot to grow and flower keep it in that spot. Some like hanging and others like it on the bench. Check light and temperature where to grow a plant year round. I had 6 growing areas at our old house and certain plants had to be grown in full sun to flower. Try to find out how a plant

grows in its native area and a lot of information can be found on the internet. Photos of plants in the wild help to tell and also asking members where they grow a plant and apply to your place.

Specimen Plant of the Month: "Stanhopea ruckeri" (syn Stanhopea inodora) Lindl., Edwards's Bot. Reg. 29: t. 44 (1843). **Grown by: Seb Torrisi** 



This was a great plant still with one spike to open. Yes another orchid with a name change probably due to the fact this being named in 1843 and the inodora was 1875 then the older name takes preference. There are a number of forms of this species, and it is great when a member can get it to a meeting because of the short flowering time. It comes from Mexico and Nicaragua. In Nicaragua, plants have been found in Jinotega Province near the Jinotega Rock Quarry at 4350 ft. ft (1320 m) and in Chontales Province at Cerro Chato at 1500 ft (450 m). The orchid grows in trees in wet mountain forests. Kennedy (1975) reported that in Mexico plants apparently grow in Veracruz near Fortin de Las Flores. However, in the literature we have searched, including Kennedy (1975) and Williams (1951), we have found no instance where the writer has actually seen material collected in Mexico. Some recent authors have indicated that the habitat for Stanhopea ruckeri extends from Mexico to Nicaragua, but we have seen no reports of collections made in Mexico, Belize, Guatemala, or Honduras. From Orchidwiz. Stanhopea are a specie that must be grown in a hanging basket and can fill a basket quite quickly. These orchids are not hard to grow. I tried one in a shallow dish using a gravel mix and it worked well as when the spikes came they went over the edge of the dish then hung to open. It has been in that dish for at least 10 years. I know a very large plant growing high up in a Jacaranda tree and grows and flowers well except for the local possums liking it. There are about now 76 named species and a few year ago there was not many at all.

## Novice Plant of the Month: Phalaenopsis Unknown

# **Grown by: Roslyn Mathews**

This was a nice Phalaenopsis grown by Roslyn. There are many now in the shops for sale as flowering pot plants and usually have no name



and are breed in Taiwan by the millions for the trade. With these orchids they must be grown inside as they won't take our winter but can grow outside under cover ok during the warmer months. They are very quick to flower from a clone or seed. I have been told the growing

temperature is night 18c and day about 25c and to flower have go below 16c to start a spike and then need a warmer temperature to make the spike grow. When the flowers drop off cut the spike just above the top node, it can make a branch spike or make a new plant, and when it gets roots hanging down cut off and pot it.
