Show Marshal Report For March 2017 Hybrid of the Month: Dendrobium [Den.] <a href="https://example.com/hybrid.c

Grown by: Angle Sulfaro

A very interesting cross of two Dendrobiums laevifolium and bracteosum making this hybrid,



both come from the New Guinea and Pacific Island area, this plant can as it gets larger in size produce a very showy plant. It was bred and registered in 2009 by Fumitaka Oomura, Tokaicity, Japan. By Orchidwiz it indicates it could be a warm grower, Angie is in a location where it would not get over cold during

the winter, and should be ok. Below are the two species.

Dendrobiums laevifolium Widespread on islands



of the southwest Pacific. Plants grow Bougainville,

Guadalcanal, Santa Isabel, the Santa Cruz Islands, Vanuatu, and in Papua New Guinea on Rossel and Misima Islands in the Louisiade Archipelago. On Misima, plants grow on mosscovered branches, twigs, and rocks in areas with a dense groundcover of mosses, begonias, ferns, and small creepers. Collections were made on the steep ridge of a



forested gully at about 3100 ft. (950 m). Reports from other parts of the habitat indicate that plants grow at 1200-7700 ft. (360-2340 m). They usually grow in thick moss near the base of trees, on moss covered saplings, or in deep lichen and moss on the trunks of elfin forest trees in areas normally saturated with cold mist or light rain with brief bursts of very hot sunshine.

Dendrobium [Den.] bracteosum New Guinea. In Papua, plants were found near Port Praslin and Punam on New Ireland (New Mecklenburg) Island at about 1650 ft. (500 m), on Rossel Island, in the Sepik River region near Aitape (Eitape) at 50-1300 ft. (20-400 m), and along the coast of northwestern Papua New Guinea at about 50 ft. (20 m). In Irian Jaya (western New Guinea), the plants grow in swamps along the Noord River. They usually grow on forest trees or close to the ground on mangroves in lowland rainforests from sea level to 2300 ft. (0-700 m), but they have been reported as high as 3950 ft. (1200 m).From Orchidwiz

<u>Specie Plant of the Month:</u> "Sarcochilus dilatatus"

F.Muell., Fragm. 1: 191 (1859). **Grown by: L & B Dobson**



A great big congratulations to Loraine and Bill on this great plant as The NSW ANOS panel judged it and gave it a FCC only the 2nd ever given by this group I have been told. Then it was also judged by the NSW judging panel and judged FCC, (see Bill's story below). It was the best I have ever seen.

A miniature sized, warm to cool growing epiphytic species occurring in Queensland and New South Wales at elevations of sea level to 400 meters.

Specimen Plant of the Month: Dendrochilum latifolium var. macranthum Lindl..

Edwards's Bot. Reg. 29(Misc.): 56 (1843).

Grown by: Peter Cristie



This plant had nice long spikes spread around the plant. These are not hard to grow and can grow into massive plants as we have seen other species shown. This one is *Found only in the Philippines in forests on trees at elevations above 300 to 2200 meters. from Orchidwiz.* They say in their records that there are 400 named species and that some are hot growers so this is something that you need to work out when growing this species. Some are only miniature in growth but all interesting.

Novice Plant of the Month: Miltoniopsis (Mps.) Up Country Puna 'Keaau Star' Grown by: M &S Howard









This was a nice Miltoniopsis, I had a problem with the name and found it was not complete it had "UP" in front of the name on card, and is right, there was a photo of the plant. It is great

to see a white like this. This has four species in its back ground, being Miltoniopsis [Mps.] unknown roezlii 57% vexillaria (33.1%) (9.0% phalaenopsis (0.9%). Notice 9.00% unknown this happens from time to time with breeders. As a point of interest this at least 11 generations from the start, and to get the color it can depend what variety color of the species used. To grow these orchids well you need the right conditions. I lost a number of plants in one night after a frost. I have a friend grows them to perfection under his benches in a cool type glass house, but could also be in a frost free area where he is. They are very attractive, another thing they do not keep if cut as are pot plant only.

lan Nelson Show Marshal/Patron Thanks Bill for your article below.

I obtained this plant from Queensland in 2009 where its family grows in vine thickets which get heaps of rain in the summer months and is a lot drier in the winter months when the temperature can drop down to single figures at night.

I grow this hanging about 2.0m above the ground in my bush-house under 2 layers of 50% woven green shade-cloth. It gets fertilised with Peters Excel Finisher at 1.5gm/l every week as all my plants do. I have been watering my small epiphytes and *Den. tetragonum* plants nightly, except when it has rained, and this year it started flowering early February. Since then more inflorescences pushed out and flowers opened to have 27 fully opened flowers that were pretty much all even in size, there are still another 25 buds to come. What a little surprise packet considering the whole plant is only 70mm high and 90mm wide

In previous years it has produced 3 or 4 inflorescences but this year with a very hot (not by Qld standards though) summer followed by what seems like weeks of rain. Since Christmas, 2-1/2 month ago,

With the rain we have had in Sydney I almost cancelled going to ANOS Sydney Group's meeting but wanted other members to see it, and I couldn't pass up a presentation on Sarcochilus from David Banks which was one of the most informative and entertaining evenings I have had in the last 30 years.

The icing on the cake was to have the plant awarded, so my wife and I are pleased to say the least, as we received a FCC from ANOS and a Cultural certificate and the following Monday night we received a FCC from OSNSW/AOC.

ALAN & MIRIAM'S NEWSLETTER **ALAN'S COLUMN APRIL 2017**

This year our orchids have had a tough time. During summer in Sydney we had a month of abnormal heat conditions then wet conditions for a couple of weeks. Growers were hit with cyclone conditions for a few weeks. Here in Sydney many growers lost a lot of plants through the heat. Watering became a problem of too much water during the heat. After a couple of days the rain set in . Many plants then became over saturated unless the plants were grown under cover! It is now April and still raining. Don't water even if plants are under cover. Wait until the mix starts to dry out, Then drench with a good organic fertiliser. Two applications ten days apart. Growers up Queensland way with their plants under water. Once the plants have had a good watering to get the flood debris off a couple of good drenches with a good organic the plants should be on their way. Watch fungal diseases in your plants such as bulb and root rot problems. There are many problems after all of these problems of bulb problems and leaf spot

problems. Maintenance sprays such as MANCOZEB, PHOS ACID, ZINEB etc. This should keep a lot of the fungi at bay! Watch for insect problems such as mealy bug – scale insects – dendrobium beetle – loopers – broad mite etc. It is a good idea to inspect plants weekly to if any critters around your plants. You can now start to repot some of your over grown plants. Rule one, if repotting during autumn is never over pot your plants especially cool growers such as Miltonias, Paphs etc. After potting spray with a good hormone mix, give plants a good soak with ANTI ROT®, remember ANTI ROT® does not control root rot. Remember most fungicides will not control RHIZOCTONIA. FUSARIUM is another fungus that is very hard to control. ERWINIA is another bacteria a very hard especially if you grow seedlings, paphs and phals. Bi card of soda at 3g per litre mixed in 5ml Eco oil can help to clean up a lot of diseases. DO NOT USE ON HOT DAYS. Potassium permanganate has been used to control rots of all types back in the old days at 3.125g per 100 litres of water.

A lot of work was done on the use of VIBREX® out on the Cecil Park Orchid Farm in the 1980's. It worked on botrytis on seedlings and flowering plants with no marked blooms. The use of VIBREX was to mix it with a activator. To control air born pathogens mix 667ml VIBREX with 667ml C 10 which is CITRIC ACID. Growing media sanitation, 1700ml VIBREX in 1700ml P6. There is a lot of literature on the use of VIBREX. As time goes on I will make out a table. For flowers we used 167ml of VIBREX in 167ml of C10 which is citric acid. ZINEB 2 1.59 + Copper Oxy in one litre of water. Stand mixture for 3 hours, agitate thoroughly before use. Mix with a good sticker not oil. This mix will help control Pseudomonas, bacterial blights etc. Not much time at the moment so a bit on the short side.

NOTE Paper Bark impossible to purchase at the moment.

Next class: will be held on Saturday afternoon 8th April at 2pm. This month we will be having an old friend of mine who was a fantastic Paph grower. So come along All welcome, learn all about paphs from seedlings to flowering. The May class should be on the 13th May.
