PLANTS OF THE EVENING Hybrid - Miltoniopsis Breathless 'Florence' -Rod Nurthen

Miltoniopsis, or Pansy Orchids -as they are commonly known- have a reputation of being difficult to grow. A reputation that is not without reason as they do

present challenges for many growers. No surprises then that a man that grows Paphs so well can grow these as well.

Complex breeding has led to an ever increasing range of colour combinations in this showy genus, and easy to see why the breeder named it Breathless.





Species - Oncidium phymatochilum - Cary Polis Oncidium phymatochilum. I should probably stop there; if you know it then you will already know how elegant and beautiful it is, and if you don't know it then words will hardly do it justice. Coming from Brazil, this used to be a miltonia, which is easy to understand looking at individual flowers up close. Whatever you call it, it is a great plant and well grown by Cary.

I use Osmocote Pro Low Phosporous 8-9 month 16 + 3.9 + 9.1 + 1.8 Mg + TE slow release prills at the start of each growing season, October, and water and fertilize weekly with Peters Excel Cal Mag Hi-K (FINISHER) 12 + 2.2 + 16.6 at the rate

of 1.5g/litre water. As the summer heat increases they get watered 2-3 times a week and if really hot an extra light watering after the sun has gone down to allow the plant to retain some water overnight.

Pests: Slugs, are probably the only pest to worry them, and only when in flower. So kill them off with slug and snail pellets while the buds are still in the sheaths.

Flowering:

Watch the sheafs in November for new flowers, and add stakes as required. The sheaths will be there for months but when the flowers come that will emerge in a rush. I usually check each day then sprinkle the plant with slug and snail bait and bring in under cover.

A word of warning, do NOT touch fresh growths and emerging flowers in the morning, allow to harden during the day and stake up just after the heat of the day has gone. Too soon and they will be in your hand.

Laelia purpurata a magnificent plant, and easy grower if given the right conditions.

For those of you who grow pterostylis the following notes are very useful -

PTEROSTYLIS CARE & CULTIVATION

Keep the plant moist at all times during the growth period, from about March to late October.

After flowering has finished, the leaves will start to turn yellow and eventually brown as the plants go into their dormant stage for the summer months. When repotting, the dead leaves and flowers can be removed and discarded.

At this stage cease watering and **let the pot dry completely**. This is important.

Over-watering during the dormant period will cause the tubers to rot.

Once the leaves have died and the pot is completely dry, leave until January to repot.

Repotting is easy. Tip the pot out and you will find the new tubers in the mix. Some new tubers will be very small, so be careful not to 'throw out the baby with the bathwater'.

My method is to use seed raising mix (Amgrow for preference). Remove any large

bits of bark and place mix in appropriate size pot for the number of tubers you find. Fill the pot to within two and a half inches from the top.

Some people use half of the previous potting mix and half new mix, but in my experience it doesn't seem to make much difference.

Place a very small pinch of blood and bone over the mix, remembering that like all native Australian plants, they don't like fertiliser. Cover with an inch of seed raising mix.

Place the tubers on the mix and cover with another inch of seed raising mix. The remainder of the pot is filled with chopped pine/casuarina needles. This is to protect the tubers and make watering easier so there is less soil disturbance.

Water the pots then place in the shade or dappled light. Only give light watering once a week until the plant shows signs of new growth in autumn.

The growth once started is quite rapid, and pest and diseases are few, but if they occur use the appropriate sprays. Watch for snails.

These orchids are easy and extremely rewarding to grow. They multiply rapidly and the floral display is both unusual and beautiful
